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# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

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Interspeech is upon us - here in Australia! Go to <http://www.interspeech2008.org/> and see for yourself. *Interspeech 2008 incorporating SST 2008* will be held from September 22 to 26 at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre, South Bank, Brisbane.

As Interspeech 2008 occurs in a *Speech Science and Technology* conference year, SST 2008 is incorporated into Interspeech 2008. As part of this incorporation there will be Special Sessions on both PANZE (the Phonetics and Phonology of Australian and New Zealand English) and OzPhon (the Phonetics and Phonology of

Australian Aboriginal Languages) and New Zealand English). In addition there are special sessions on a range of issues from a 'Visual Speech Synthesis Challenge' to 'Cross-Linguistic Perception and Production of Lexical Tone'. There will also be a range of Tutorials on the first day of the conference (Monday September 22) given by fine scholars from Australia and internationally. Finally, there are four Keynote speakers: Abeer Alwan from UCLA will speak on Automatic Speech Recognition; Joaquin Gonzalez-Rodriguez from the University Autonoma de Madrid will speak on Forensic Automatic Speaker Recognition; and Justine Cassell from Northwestern University will talk on Embodied Conversational Agents; and the newly announced ISCA Medallist, Hiroya Fujisaki, will give the opening keynote on a topic yet to be determined (watch this space, or more immediately the website).

An innovation this year is that we have two submission types - Full (4-page) or Short (1 page) papers. Both are reviewed in the same way using the same criteria, and both appear in the Conference



Proceedings as either a 4- or a 1-page paper. This is so that a range of needs can be catered for. In the case where the conference may be the final destination of a paper, then the full 4-page paper format should be used; in the case where later submission to a journal is a goal, then the short 1-page paper is appropriate.

This then means that people can submit their *best* work to Interspeech 2008, no matter what the later destination of that work may be. And this is a wonderful opportunity for speech researchers, staff and students alike, to present their best work to an international audience. I'll see you there.

## CONFERENCE REPORTS

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### **Michael Tyler**

*University of Western Sydney  
New Sounds 2007*

The Fifth International Symposium on the Acquisition of Second Language Speech (New Sounds 2007) was held in sunny Florianopolis, Brazil, last December. This brought together researchers from 19 countries for a stimulating set of sessions investigating how humans learn to perceive and produce speech events in a language other than their native one. My own paper was received well, and the feedback was very helpful, and I saw many stimulating talks from researchers in psychology, linguistics, and education. Being a rea-

sonably small conference, I was fortunate to have the opportunity to talk with two eminent keynote speakers, Ocke-Schwen Bohn and Paul Iverson, and catch up and socialise with my contemporaries.

Brazil is a massive country and it would have been impossible to see anything but a small portion of what it has to offer. The highlight of my trip was seeing the Iguazu Falls, featured in the 1986 film "The Mission", which are thought to be second in the world to Victoria Falls. Rio was unkind with its weather – a clear view of the statue of Christ at the bottom was covered with cloud by the time we got to the top! Luckily the clouds

parted for a moment and I got to see the statue in its glory for a brief moment.

I was even interviewed in the street by Brazilian TV, huddled under an umbrella, asking if I was disappointed about the uncharacteristic weather! It all turned out well in the end, though. On the very last day the sun came out and I was able to see architect Oscar Niemeyer's fantastic Contemporary Art Museum in Niteroi before sipping caipirinhas and watching it set over Rio from Sugarloaf Mountain (...featured in the 1979 film "Moonraker").

Odyssey 2008*

2008 Odyssey-Speaker and Language Recognition Workshop was held in Stellenbosch, South Africa. This year's workshop was co-hosted by Spescom DataVoice and the Digital Signal Processing Group of Stellenbosch University.

This was the very first series of Odyssey held in the southern hemisphere. Stellenbosch is a scenic university town, situated in the winelands of the Western Cape. About 30 papers were presented at the workshop. Apparently the number of papers was not as many

as previous workshops, but this was apparently due to the fact that only 1.5 years had passed since the last workshop (usually there is a two year gap between workshops). Some papers were presented from the University of Canberra, the Australian National University and Queensland University of Technology. It is always good to see some familiar faces at conferences.

It was a small workshop yet very focused in a relaxed atmosphere, and provided me with an excellent opportunity to come to know other young researchers like myself and talk to some experts in this area. One of the trends I noticed at the workshop is that the support vector machine is used as a discriminant classifier in many of the presented papers. I would like to thank ASSTA for providing financial assistance for me to attend this workshop.
